## Candidates respond to Chamber's questions

Aiken will elect a new Mayor for the first time since 1991. The candidates, Rick Osbon and Lessie Price, agreed to answer written questions on topics relevant to the November 3 election. Below are the unedited responses submitted by each candidate.



## What do your first 100 days in office look like? Be specific.

I will immediately conduct policy reviews with an appointed committee of community and business leaders where we will review and streamline the way the city does business.
